SANITATION IN THE DOCK WARD.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CARONICLE.

DEAR SIR,—As one of the members representing the Dock Ward in the Borough Council, I think it my duty to call the attention of the readers of your valuable journal and the public to the saustary condition of portion of this Ward.

A short time ago I visited the houses in Vize's Fields to see how they stood as regards w.c.'s and sewerage, and to my surprise I found that there were eighty inhabited houses, all within a radius of about three hundred yards (50 in Vize's Fields, and 30 in School House Lane and Little Barrington Speet, immediately behind St. Joseph's Lew Church), completely devoid of sanitary accommodation or sewerage, notwithstanding that one of the best main sewers in the city passes through the locality. Seven new cottages have been recently built in this area, and are provided with all the necessary sanitary arrangements, and connected with the main sewer.

I then took in the Windmill district, and

found there only one w.c. connected with the main sewer, out of about fifty houses, seven being without yards. There is a very fine main sewer running through the Dock road at one end, and Henry-street at the other end of this area.

I would like to know very much where the sanitary officer comes in as regards his inspection of these two areas, or have they been ever reported to the sanitary authorities?—although they evidently do their duty well in other wards, going even to the extent of examining the roofs, and if they find any slates off, serve a summons on the owner.
