## SUICIDE AT SINGLAND.

### Labourer Hangs Himself.

A painful case of suicide is reported from the outskirts of the city this morning, the victim being a carman named William Lawlor. About ten o'clock Mr. John Cunneen, farmer, Singland, was engaged in making an inspection of his lands. When in a field adjacent to St. Patrick's Cemetery he discovered the rigid form of Lawlor suspended by means of a rope from the limb of a hawthorne tree. He at once reported the occurrence to the police at Blackboy, and in a few minutes Sergeant Kelly was on the scene of the awful tragedy. The remains were cut down and are at present deposited in an outhouse of Mr. Cunneen's awaiting an inquest. From the appearance of the body everything points to the act having been committed some hours previously. No motive is assigned for Lawlor taking his life, save that a horse which he used to earn his living with died yesterday. The deceased, who was a widower, and aged about 50 years, leaves one daughter to mourn his tragic end. From the nature of the method employed in the construction of the rude scaffold, everything points to the man's self-destruction being a pre-conceived affair. In addition to the piece of rope utilised, there were also strips of a towel employed in the making of a noose, and in tying the rope to the bough.
