DEATH OF MR. Z. J. LEDGER.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Z. J. Ledger, principal of the old established book selling and stationery establishment of Ledger and Sons, who passed away at his residence, 27 George street, on Thursday night. Mr. Ledger had been in failing health for a considerable time past, and his demise was not quite unexpected. He was a member of an old Limerick family, and though of a very retiring and unassuming disposition, he was widely known and esteemed in Limerick and the surrounding counties. He had attained the fine old age of eighty years, but all who had the pleasure of knowing him at any period of his honourable, active, and useful life, will be sorry to hear of the severing of one of the few remaining links that connect us with a generation fast passing away. We tender to Mr. Ledger's family our sympathy in their bereavement. The funeral will take place from St. Michael's Church for Mungret on Monday, after the service, which will be held at 9.30 a.m.

front, he became Prime Minister of England (applause). They might, therefore, take a moral from that story, and so any of them who had not won prizes should not despond, but keep plodding along, for education in the school was not merely acquisition of knowledge, but a preparation of the mind to receive a more extensive knowledge hereafter. They all learned a great deal more after they had left school or college than they did at those places, but they were, as he had said, taught in school to prepare their minds to take in further knowledge during the years of discretion. The training and striving for the prize brought with it very great advantages.

Better than fame is still the wish for fame, The constant training for the glorious strife, The athlete wrestling in Olympian games, Gains strength at least for life.

Although they might not win the prize the striving for an ideal would be of advantage to them in the end. His Lordship said that he must congratulate that school on the manner in which six or eight boys went up for the intermediate examination and answered so successfully. Thirty per cent was enough to pass, but some of them had attained three times that percentage in answering. His Lordship referring next to the curriculum of the school, of which religious instruction formed a part, said he hoped they would never see religion separated from secular instruction, the two must go together to make their young people grow up to be men and women who would be good citizens of this world with a certain prospect of being citizens of the great world hereafter (applause).
