A MUCH NEEDED MOVE.

The Fairs of Ennis.

Speaking at a very large and representative meeting held in the Town Hall of Eunis on Thursday afternoon, the Most i ev. Dr. Fogarty R.C. Bishop of Killaloe, strongly urged that something should be done to save the fairs from extinction, and to stop the pernicious system of forestalling.

Resolutions were unanimously passed urging all to strictly adhere in future to the fixed dates, and asking the clergy, and all who are interested in the commercial life of the country to give their help to have this resolution carried into effect.

A further resolution was passed urging the Urben Council to use their authority to keep the streets of Ennis free from fairs except on the day properly fixed.

Another resolution condemned the system of large buyers purchasing on the farms, and urged that the practice should be discontinued.

A very large and representative committee was appointed to see the resolutions carried into effect.
