# TRAGIC OCCURRENCE.

## Sudden Death in a Train.

A very sad affair, which appears to have occurred with tragic suddenness, took place this morning near Lisnagry station, on the Limerick and Castleconnell line. It would seem that a domestic servant named Anne Matthews, aged between 45 and 50, in the employment of Mr. O'Connor, Thornfield, was coming into the city to transact some business, and got into the train at Lisnagry. She became suddenly unwell, and died after the train had got a short distance outside that station. When the train arrived in Limerick, at 11.30, the body was conveyed to one of the apartments at the station, and remains there pending instructions from the coroner for East Limerick, Dr. Clery, with whom the police have communicated by wire.

It is said that deceased ran to catch the train and had not time to get a ticket. A minute or so after entering the carriage the poor woman collapsed, and everything was done for her by her fellow-passengers, but without result. Death is supposed to have been due to heart failure.
