### Irish Meat.

At Limerick No. 2 District Council to-day, Mr. A  
Stitche presiding, a letter was read from the  
Secretary of the Dublin Victuallers Association for-  
warding a resolution adopted by the Executive  
Committee to the effect that with the object of  
fostering native produce and assisting in the develop-  
ment of the many industries and sources of employ-  
ment dependent upon the live-stock trade they  
condemned—"the practice of public and charitable  
institutions, training colleges, and other educational  
establishments supporting foreign syndicates that  
vend imported frozen meat, as those local institutions  
and establishments are mainly maintained by Irish  
money, and this Association respectfully suggests  
that in all tender forms it should be stipulated that  
none but Irish meat be tendered for."

Mr. D. F. M'Namara—We always do that.  
The resolution was unanimously adopted.
