More defects than one dreams of are attributable to dirty dishes and measures. Not even millionaires can afford to throw away bottles, dishes, and graduates after once or twice using; for one thing it would be too much bother; so we are thrown back on cleanliness as a compulsory virtue. In cleaning your dishes do not forget that the first thing is to prepare a clean rack or shelf to receive the dishes when cleaned; next, that the outside as well as the inside of the dish must be cleansed. "Get into the corners," for must be cleansed. there the hypo and other contaminating stains rest secure from cursory rinsings. There are special curved and crooked brushes made for the purpose of cleaning corners; but it is a good plan to tie a piece of hard, scrubby loofah to the end of a bit of firewood by means of a fine, strong string. With this, strong acid (hydrochloric is the best) can be applied to very dirty or scaly dishes, without the fear of our fingers being injured. Do not empty hydrochloric acid down lead pipes or sinks; throw it away down the outside earthen-ware drain, and even then dilute it with water. Monkey Brand soap, or for new enamel dishes Sapolio, with a good nail-brush, will clean ordinary dirt from dishes. Salt followed by water will give the final assurance of freedom from contaminating chemicals.
