

PARLIAMENTARY AND MUNICIPAL FRANCHISE.

A New Phase.

Twelve o'clock last night was the latest hour at which applications for claims to the Franchise of 1906 could be received. In order to facilitate those who were unable to make their claims, the Town Hall was opened until midnight, when however, the rush for forms was incl nearly as great as twelve months ago. The absence of a Municipal triennial election in January next had much to say to this, as well as the summary manner in which his Honor Judge Adams dealt with 3 000 new or lodger claims at the last revision. The total number of voters on the list, as published by the Town Clerk, amounts to 6,418, which is made up of 4,961 men and 1,487 women voters. The number of new claims lodged up to 12 o'clock last night is as follows :-Lodgers, 60; householders, 201; freeholders and leaseholders, 78, and 15 freemen. We understand that all claimants, including lodger claimants, must be officially officed to by the Town Clerk, by direction of his Honor Judge Adams, a fact that makes it incumbent on them to attend the revision and claim their votes.
