At the meeting of the Technical Committee last evening, respecting the audit of the accounts of Mr. Dundou, Law Agent, wrote stating that the Committee were legally bound to have their accounts audited by the Local Government Board Auditor.

At the Police Court to-day, before the Hon. J. French, K.M., two women charged with loitering on the street were sentenced to a month's imprisonment each, in default of paying a fine of 40s.

On the recommendation of Lord Dunalley His Majesty's Lieutenant of the County Tipperary, Lord Ashbourne has issued his warrant, appointing Thomas Kenny, Kilcarron, Lower Ormond, to the Commission of the Peace.

Through the exertions of the local branch of the Gaelic League, the shop assistants attached to the various establishments in Killarney have formed themselves into an Association to forward the sale of Irish manufactured goods.

Bostonians are urging the erection of a monument in honour of St. Brendan, the patron saint of Clonfert, who, with Leif Ericson, shares the honour of being one of the Roman Catholic precursors of Columbus in discovering America.

Gort is going to have a race meeting. It is satisfactory for patrons of local racing to learn that a fixture (the 20th June) has been obtained for the old famous Newtown course, under the Irish National Hunt Rules, by Major Kenny, Limerick, and Mr. John H. Glynn, D.C., Gort.

At Nenagh £234 8s. 8d. of the consolidated rate and £166 1s. 3d. poor rate of the last half year, and £562 0s. 9d. consolidated and £379 17s. 8d. poor rate of the present half year was outstanding. The Council has ordered the rate collectors to close their accounts within a fortnight.

On Monday the funeral took place of the late Mr. Thomas O'Carroll, spirit merchant, Garvey's Range, whose death occurred on Saturday evening last after a short illness. The late Mr. O'Carroll was well known in the city, and the utmost sympathy is expressed for his bereaved wife and daughters in their sad affliction.

We regret to hear of the death of the Rev. Martin F. Daly, second eldest son of Mr. Patrick Daly, Mill street, Ennis, which has just occurred at an early age at the Salecian College St. Madonna Dei Laghi Avigliana Torino, Italy, after a brief illness. Rev. Mr. Daly had received Minor Orders, as Deacon, and was to have been ordained priest in a short time.

"Couldn't they attend coursing matches without getting drunk?" was the remark of a Kilrush magistrate yesterday in reference to the charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct brought against four or five young men at Cooraclare on the day of the recent coursing match held there, at the suit of Constable Turnbull and Sergeant Doherty. The penalties were—10s. 6d., 5s., and 2s. 6d. each, respectively, and costs, with alternatives of retirement in his Majesty's free lodgings at Limerick.

Rev. Gordon Stowell Greer, M.A., Rector of Killohane, has declined the parish in the Diocese of Killala to which he was recently appointed.

The County Petty Sessions were not held to-day, owing to the absence of a magistrate. The list was not, however, a long one and the cases unimportant.

Owing to indisposition, Lord Dunraven has to cancel his engagement to speak on Ireland at the meeting of Edinburgh Young Scots last night.

Sir Horace Plunkett is making satisfactory progress towards recovery. His general health is good, and it is hoped he will be able to leave his room in the course of a few days.

The "Dublin Gazette" announces that the Right Honourable Ralph Francis, Earl of Wicklow, has been elected a representative Peer for Ireland in room of the late Earl of Lanesborough.

Messrs Abraham Sutton and Co, of Cork, have placed fifteen tons of coal for distribution among the poor of Cashel with the Very Rev. Des Kinnane, P.P., and five tons for a similar purpose with Dean White.

At a special meeting of the Waterford Corporation it was decided to apply to Parliament for authority to purchase compulsorily the ferry and bridge rights of the Bridge Commissioners.

The Dublin Drapery Association has promised to co-operate with the Industrial Development Association in pushing Irish manufacture and in giving preference to same when the value is equal to the imported goods.

Kilmallock Guardians have decided to ask the Local Government Board if they were determined to carry out the order to increase the Medical Officers' salaries to send down a seal order. The Chairman dissented.

Northumberland Fusiliers—Lieutenant-Colonel and Brevet Colonel D. Stewart, C.B., on completion of his period of service in command of a battalion, is placed on half-pay, Major C. James being Lieutenant-Colonel vice Brevet Colonel Stewart C.B.

The wages of B. Raleigh, shoe-maker, Kilmallock Workhouse have been increased from 17s. to £1 per week. On the motion of Mr. Kearney, the salary of Mrs. Mary Lynn night nurse, was increased from £20 to £22 per year.
