300 tons of new seed potatoes have arrived in Killybegs last week for distribution amongst the small farmers of the union.

The stores of Messrs George White and Sons at Waterford, were totally destroyed by fire. The damage is estimated at £2,000.

At the Tralee fortnightly pig fair there were 350 pigs in market, prices being from 48s. to 50s. per cwt.; 200 bonhams, 20s. to 28s. each.

Sir John Marcus Stewart, Bart., died at Belfast on Sunday evening. Sir John, who was a D. L. for County Tyrone, was 74 years of age.

The two-year-old son of Thomas Fitzpatrick, Ballymackenry, Drogheda, died a few days since from poisoning caused by sucking the heads of lucifer matches.

An entertainment in aid of St. Ita's House, Thomas Street, was held at the Athenæum on Sunday evening and was largely attended by members of the house and their friends.

The case brought against McCarthy's, Limerick, for selling beer, etc., without a licence, was not heard at the Sixmile Bridge Petty Sessions owing to not having a sufficient number of magistrates to adjudicate.

Drugs sent for analyses from the Kilkee Dispensary have been pronounced of good quality.

At the last meeting of the Killybegs Urban Council, a Gas Committee was appointed to inspect the gas works from time to time.

Head Constable P. M'Brade, on promotion from Tipperary (S.R.), has been appointed to the Taghamon District, Co. Wexford.

The police barrack at Knockrour, near Castleisland, Co. Kerry, has been abolished, and the men stationed thereat transferred to other districts.

An international hockey match between Ireland and Wales, played at Cork on Saturday, resulted in a win for Ireland by 8 goals to 2.

There died a few days ago in the Croom Workhouse, a man named O'Sullivan, aged 102 years. He was in good health up to a few weeks before his death.

The members of the Killybegs Urban Council passed a resolution at their last meeting protesting against the action of the Clare County Council in abolishing the main road system in Clare.

At the annual meeting of the Irish Amateur Rowing Union on Saturday evening, the various Regatta fixtures were arranged. Limerick was arranged for the 18th and 19th July.

Nurney Station, Co. Kildare, has been discontinued as a Constabulary sub-district. It is rumoured that three others will follow suit in the same county in a short time.
