Many besides myself have doubtless, suffered at the hands of a player who, having hit his own ball, starts off after it without waiting for his adversary to play. The offence I have in my mind is less gross than that but it is very frequent and most annoying. It happens when two balls are lying wide apart, though level in point of distance from tee or hole. Your adversary plays and then marches gaily on apparently oblivious of you or your ball or your stroke, and you have to play while conscious that he is serenely moving onwards and does not care doit whether his doing so puts you off your stroke or not. Another most irritating habit among players is that of going forward a few yards beyond the tee after their shot, when they have had the honour and you have still to deliver your drive.—Ernest Lehmann in "The Bystander."
