### OUTRAGES NEAR ATHENRY.

A series of outrages have taken place near Athenry. Mr. Murphy, of Ballinrobe, has a grazing farm near Kintulla, and the stock were driven through the country and the tail taken from one animal, and others maimed. Mr. O'Loughlin, of Cashel, Connemara, who had a grazing farm near Athens, has his cattle driven from the farm, and some of them injured by the use of the knife. A herd named Fitztrick was also subjected to another outrage. An animal of his was fearfully maimed. All these outrages are alleged to be due to the fact that those who hold grazing farms in the district refuse to give that up. No arrests have been made, although it is thought that a large number must have been engaged committing these outrages.

The most recently discovered silver deposit in Canada, a vein found to the north of existing ones in Ontario, has already proved very remunerative. An official return states that the first six loads of ore sent to New Jersey, turned in all 75,000 dollars.

While watching a fire at Skipton, a man fell to the canal, and was rescued in torchlight by "human chain" of onlookers.
