The Inquest

Sergeant Beckett conducted the inquiry, and the evidence adduced by Catherine Hanley and Margaret Moloney went to show that after parting with the deceased at 10 o'clock on the night of the fatality they heard a fall, and on going to the place from whence the noise came, observed Mrs Vaughan on the ground at the foot of the stairs. Mrs Mahony raised her up but she did not speak.
