## DEATH OF MR. MICHAEL WOULFE.

City Treasurer.

We regret to have to announce the death of Mr. Michael Woulfe, City Treasurer, which took place at his residence, Clare Street, at six o'clock last evening. By his death the Corporation loses one of its eldest and most trusted officials, and the city a man that had for upwards of a quarter of a century judiciously presided over its financial destinies. To say that he was in every respect fitted for the position he held would be only giving the faintest idea of his abilities as a financier. There was nothing appertaining to, or connected with the Municipal revenue for nearly half a century that he did not know, and there are few men holding public positions in Ireland or elsewhere who more ably discharged the responsibilities that devolved on them than the gentleman that has just passed away. He lived practically for his office, and died, it might be almost said, in harness. Three months ago he received a paralytic stroke, from the effects of which his attenuated frame never recovered. He had since been confined to his room, and, knowing that he would never again be able to return to the service of the municipality, he asked to have a pension settled on him. His request was promptly granted, and the Committee that sat to investigate his claim, recommended that a retiring allowance equal to two-thirds of his salary be given him. The proposal was in due time forwarded to the Lord Lieutenant for approval, and a few weeks later the Viceregal sanction was given thereto. He, however, has not survived to enjoy the superannuation so generously bestowed on him, and so amply deserved, inasmuch as the Council had not up deserved, masmuch as the Council had not up to his death received his resignation, which left him in receipt of his salary as City Treasurer. In addition to the position the late Mr. Woulfe held under the Corporation, he was Registrar of Kileely Burial Board, and distributor of outdoor relief in the city, a position that brought him into touch with all classes of the poor, for whom he had ever a kind and sympathetic word. Forty-eight years ago he became attached to the financial department of the Corporation as an assistant, and in 1883, on the retirement of Mr. Wm. McDonnell, J.P., from the treasurership, he was given the appointment. The duties of that position he discharged with discretion and skill down to his enforced abstention, which, in addition to the affliction of three months ago, was brought about through the death of his only son in May of last year. The deceased was 69 years of age, and leaves two daughters to mourn his demise. The funeral will take place on Thursday from St. Mary's R.C. Church, for Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.
