A heavy gale has been raging along the south coast of Ireland since Saturday, and on Sunday night the wind was blowing with hurricane violence. At daylight on Sunday morning the Guard liner Germania, from Liverpool, arrived at the town to embark mails and passengers, but owing to the storm she did not venture to go into the harbour, her captain intimating by wireless telegraphy that he would remain off until the weather moderated. All the Channel passenger steamers which arrived during the day experienced bad weather. The Germania engaged in Admiralty work four days, and another went ashore.

Mr. James Quinn, senior clerk in the office of the Secretary of the South Tipperary County Council, died suddenly at Clonmel on Tuesday.

The Inspector's report on the state of the Kildysart Union School read at Tuesday's meeting of the Board of Guardians, was very creditable, and the board congratulated Miss Murphy, teacher, on the result of the inspection.

Last week Miss Cleary, whose pupils have distinguished themselves both in dancing and pianoforte playing, gave her annual concert in the Town Hall, Tipperary, and the event, which was most attractive and successful, was very largely attended. Amongst the artistes was Mr. Gullén, Limerick.

The death of Mrs. Macnamara, Toureen, Croom, at the advanced age of 96 years was much regretted by the inhabitants and a large circle of friends, by whom she was held in the highest esteem. The funeral was large and representative, people having attended from different parts of the county to testify to the regard in which she was held.

The storm which prevailed in West Limerick on the night of December 30th was of a terrific character. The steam yacht Ithuriel, the property of Mr. Vandeleur, experienced a severe time at her moorings at Caharcon, and would have foundered but for the skill of Mr. P. Lillis, captain, who kept on half steam during the night to ensure safe anchorage, and succeeded in getting her into the harbour at Kildysart on the following morning uninjured. The captain, being interviewed, stated he had made several sea voyages to different places and had never experienced a gale so severe as that of Saturday night; in fact he stated that he had the life-belts and other equipments in readiness, not knowing the moment he and the others on board would have to requisition their services.

Mr. Frederick Rhodes Armitage, Nean, Co. Tipperary, and Mr. Arnold le Poer Power, of Abbeyville, were yesterday sworn in as High Sheriff and Under-Sheriff respectively of the County Tipperary, before Mr. W. M. Casey, Commissioner of Oaths for the High Courts of Justice in Ireland, at the Courthouse, Clonmel.

The John-street police last night arrested Alice Bond on a charge of stealing from the person of John Moloney, a Clareman, the sum of £2. Moloney was accosted by the woman in Upper Denmark-street, when he stopped to speak to her, and in the meantime fell a victim to her wiles. Accused was this morning remanded.

The National Concert Company of Ireland, the members of which recently made their debut at Omagh, Co. Tyrone, are expected to visit Limerick at an early date. The company includes Miss Agnes O'Higgins, a Co. Limerick lady, who was born near Bruff, and who possesses a sweet and well trained voice, who has won many distinctions in the musical world.

The "Salem News," Peabody, Mass., United States, says—At a regular meeting of Company H, 5th regiment, at Wakefield, Sergt. Michael Enright, through his steadiness and accurate shooting, was given the award of being the best marksman in his company. According to the report of Mr. F. B. Henn, Paradise, Ennis, Co. Clare, the total rainfall was 37.99 in., the wettest month March, with 5.94 in. and the wettest day August 8th, with 1.23 in., while rain fell on 228 days. Mr. C. P. Bolton, Brook Lodge, Waterford, records a total fall of 33.48 in. (no less than 6.67 in. under the average) Here again March was the wettest month, with 5.58, but August 25th was the wettest day, with 1.55 in., and rain fell on 184 days.
