No further news regarding movements of Ferreira has reached London this morning. It is thought probable that he is now making for the Transvaal border in the hope of arousing the Western Transvaal farmers.

In the House of Commons yesterday, replying to a question from Mr. Balfour, Mr. Churchill said the Cape Government had telegraphed that Ferreira with five armed followers had crossed the German border, and surprised two police posts, wounding two constables, and stealing horses, arms and ammunition.
