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**AMAZING STATEMENT.**

Startling developments are expected in connection with the Soap Trust. Lever Brothers have (says the "Daily Chronicle") bought out the other firms in the combine, and it is rumoured that a huge combine to cover Europe and America is being attempted, with the co-operation of the Beef Trust. Already prices have been raised, the profits of retailers cut down from 20 to 13 per cent, and many employees of the "Trust" soap firms dismissed. Should the Trust get to work, the next development will probably be an imitation of the Tobacco Trust. There will be tied shops, and shopkeepers who stock any other soaps besides those of the combine will be boycotted. Foreseeing all these eventualities, the retailers are up in arms, and are determining to back up the firms outside the combine to the best of their power. The purchasing public should do its share.

**GREAT MUNSTER FAIR.**

The cattle and sheep fair was held yesterday, the weather being quite different from that of Thursday, which was an ideal autumn day. Rain fell in the morning, advanced, and continued late into the day. The cattle market was good. Milch cows were dear and there was a good demand for finished cattle. Three-year old heifers went as high as £15, the general quotations being from £11 to £13. Beef sold at 5s. per cwt., medium going at 5s. per cwt., and inferior touching down so 4s. per do. Mutton, which was scarce, sold at from 6½d to 7½d per lb on foot, and the supply was not at all equal to the demand. Prices, on the whole, were firm, to the advantage of sellers, and there was a good clearance of the stock offered for sale. Three-year old bullocks fetched from £15 10s to £17, two-year olds, £11 to £13; and yearlings went at prices varying from £6 to £9, according to condition. Two-year-old heifers realized from £9 to £11, while milch cows and springers brought from £14 to £18, some fancy lots going as high as £21. Buyers were in attendance from all the home and Cross-Channel markets.

**SAD COINCIDENCE.**

We noticed in our obituary column the death on the 17th inst., after a short illness, of the Rev. Gerald N. O. G. Beere, M.A., Rector of Larne, eldest son of Nenon F. Beere, Esq., Bayview, Greystones. He had not been long appointed to the charge of the important parish of Larne, and during his short time as Rector he had won the esteem and love of his people. He laboured hard for their welfare, and had just succeeded in establishing schools at a cost of £3,000, and up to date in every modern requirements. The death of a dearly loved son in full vigour of manhood, and in the midst of his usefulness, was a great shock to his father, Mr. N. F. Beere, from which he never rallied, and he passed away peaceably at his residence near Greystones on 24th inst., just a week after his son's death. Mr. Nenon F. Beere was fourth son of Rev. Gerald Beere, formerly Prebendary of Limerick Cathedral. He leaves two sons still in the Ministry. Rev. F. Beere, M.A., Rector of Street, Co. Longford, and Rev. Clement H. Beere, A.B., Rector of Laseor, Co. Meath.
