THE EXHIBITION.

SWEET PEA SHOW.

In connection with the Munster-Connaught Exhibition a Sweet Pea Show was held yesterday. It was a very interesting and attractive show, there being a great variety of sweet peas, including many that are quite new. The collection which is representative of many parts of Ireland, has been spoken of in the highest terms by experts. In connection with the National Sweet Pea Society, under Clasp, there are exhibits by Col. the Hon. G. F. Crichton, Mullaboden, Naas, and Lord Dunleath, Ballywater Park. Messrs Alex. Dickson and Sons, Dawson street, Dublin, have a large trade exhibit, and the open classes include Mr. W. Lumley Perrier, Blackrock, Cork; Col. Crichton, Naas; Sir Jocelyn Gore Booth, Lisadell, Sligo; Major Hickman, Newmarket-on-Fergus; Lady Barrington, Miss L. Shaw, Mrs. Grene Barry, Sandville; Mrs. Edmund Dease, Rev. R. Scott, Elizabeth Lady Barrington, etc. Mr. S. Appetell-Jones, Gowering Nursery, Kilkenny, sends a very fine collection of sweet peas, stove and greenhouse plants, etc. In the centre of the Hall are some very tastefully arranged small tables on which are epiphytes and glass stands containing flowers and fruit—illustrative of table decoration. These exhibitors include Mrs. E. Stevenson, Ballinacurra, Limerick; Mrs. McNamara, Ardair, Ballinacurra; Miss Gerald Goodbody, and Miss Ina Kenelly.

The show was opened at twelve o'clock by the Mayor, the Ladies Orchestra playing some choice selections.

The Mayor said that was the first show of its kind that had been held in Ireland, and it might be the fore-runner of many successful shows of the same character (hear, hear). A love of flowers was a great trait in the character of any people, and it was a great characteristic of the Irish people (hear, hear). He did not think that anyone looking at that show would say they were backward in any way, and it reflected great credit on all concerned (hear, hear).
