UNEXPECTED DEATH.

On Thursday evening he was walking around, and retired to bed at his usual hour. Early in the morning his condition became serious, and he died some time afterwards. Deceased, who was about 35 years of age, was unmarried.

THE LAX WEIR FISHERY.

The property known as the Lax Weir Fishery which was recently purchased from the Shannon Company by an English Syndicate, has been taken over by its new owners, and arrangements are in course of progress to begin fishing operations at once. With this object in view Mr. Patrick McInerney, the new manager, has for the past few days been busily engaged in carrying out what should prove effective measures in the development of the fishery. Several new boats have been added to those in existence, and it is also proposed to augment the staff of men who were employes of the old company so as to bring the number up to sixty, or possibly more. This undoubtedly will confer a boon on local fisher folk, and whose existence at present is a most precarious and uncertain one.

Upwards of 10,000 grey mullet have been poisoned in the river Brit, Dorset, it is supposed by waste discharge from a factory.

The new premises of the Shannon Rowing Club are to be opened on the 17th inst. with a Club dinner.

Newcastle West Guardians yesterday decided to leave unaltered the scale of salaries fixed for the doctors at a previous meeting, 29 for and 3 against any increase.

Arthur Monaghan, aged 108 years, has just died at Mogadd, County Down.

"Poteen" has caused the death of one man in Galway, while several others are lying seriously ill from the effects of overdoses of the liquor.

Peter Harte, charged with assaulting a girl named Galley, at Ennis, by throwing stones at her, was yesterday proved to be a dangerous lunatic, and was sent by the Magistrates to the asylum.

The Rev. Father Little, P.P. of Quin, has been appointed Canon of Killaloe by the Bishop.

Nenagh's liabilities amount to £661 3s 9d, against which there is £1,175 uncollected rates, £400 of which are stated to be bad.

Snow is falling heavily to-day throughout the whole of North Wales. Railway traffic is impeded.

The English and Catholic Missions at Changpu, a town thirty miles from Peking, have been destroyed by Boxers. The damage is estimated at £10,000.

A terrible catastrophe occurred at the South Rose Deep yesterday morning, when the heavy rains flooded the Budd shaft, and fifty-five natives were drowned.

By referring a bill of costs to the taxing-master the Thames Conservancy has just saved £13—and paid £49 in fees.

All public directorships were, says the "Liberal Magazine," given up by the present Cabinet Ministers on the acceptance of office.

A visitor at a Cologne hotel has disappeared, leaving behind a trunk full of notes and bonds to the value of £5,000 and a large sum of money in gold.

Mr. P. Clancy, eldest son of Mr. Dan Clancy, Ballymacraven, Ennistymon, has succeeded in getting into the Metropolitan Police Force in an examination in which only 15 were successful out of 104 candidates.

Henry MacMahon, Boheen, for assaulting Kate Boldes, Lifford, was sent to gaol for a month by the Ennis magistrates yesterday. He struck her two severe blows without cause, and sent her reeling.

At two o'clock on Friday afternoon the chief of police was mortally wounded at Kutais. The attack took place in the centre of the town, and the assassin escaped. The town is now surrounded by troops.

Although Princess Ena of Battenburg is only entering the Catholic Church just before her wedding day, it is stated that for many years past she has expressed a desire to become a Catholic.

A woman who asked the Lambeth Guardians
