Stokes remarks a little more attention to cleanliness, as applied to the latter, would help to improve their value. The flowers, both cut in boxes, were all choice specimens and the vegetables sent in furnished an excellent idea of how rural life in this part of the country is being rehabilitated. The par were plump and firm, as were also the cabbages and onions. The pens of poultry attracted attention, and it was with no little difficulty the judge made her awards, so good were the breed and general care of the birds. The produce was likewise representative, while industries supplied a magnificent object-lesson as to what is being accomplished in even our homesteads through the instrumentality of the Fenloe Show to equip the future mothers of the race with that knowledge requisite to make them good and capable housewives.
