### LIMERICK SLANDER CASE.

"I was in that man's factory in Limerick and saw more faking of margarine and butter and cheese there than I ever saw in my life. He is the greatest faker in Ireland."

These words formed the subject matter of an action for slander heard by Mr. Justice Wright and a city common jury in the Nisi Prius Court yesterday.

The plaintiff was Mr. Robert Gibson, butter merchant, Limerick, and the defendant, Mr. J. Daly, butter merchant, Cork.

The plaintiff's case was that on February 10th, 1906, at the Cork Police Court, the defendant falsely and maliciously spoke the words complained of, and he alleged that the meaning of the words was that he (plaintiff) cheated or was guilty of fraudulent, corrupt, and dishonest practices in his trade and business.

The defence was a formal denial that the words were spoken, but if they were spoken it was not in the defamatory sense alleged, but merely as vulgar abuse.

The jury found for the plaintiff, and assessed damages at one farthing.

Messrs. M. J. Bourke, K.C.; E. J. Phelps and P. Kelly (instructed by Mr. Charles Gabriel) appeared for the plaintiff.

Messrs. Moriarty, K.C.; Healy, K.C., and A. M. Sullivan (instructed by Mr. Maurice Healy), appeared for the defendant.

In the course of the evidence it was stated that defendants uttered the words in the course of a prosecution at Cork, to which plaintiff was subpoenaed as a witness. After the conclusion of the case the defendant spoke the words complained of to Lord Ikerrin while sticking his head into his (plaintiff's) face. Plaintiff immediately replied—"You are a blasted liar; you are an infernal scoundrel, and if you come outside I'll put that answer down your throat and with it your teeth to digest it." He added—"I have been in business all these years, and my factory is open to everybody, and I challenge anybody to say that I ever did anything in the shape of faking. If you come out of this I'll show you whether I am a faker or not." The defendant made no answer to these words; he only grinned and plaintiff left to catch his train.

Defendant emphatically denied that he called Mr. Gibson a faker, and the jury gave their verdict as stated.
