A NOVEL RESOLUTION

Asked by the Gaelic League to vote in favour of making St. Patrick's Day a national holiday, the Kilmallock Guardians discussed the matter, urging that every Irishman should be a teetotaler. Eventually Mr. Hayes proposed, and Mr. Lyons seconded:—"That we are prepared to adopt this resolution when every member of the Gaelic League becomes a total abstainer, and that a copy be sent to the Gaelic League." The resolution was carried unanimously.

Traffic Inspector Patrick Cullinan, G.S. and W.R., Enni, who saved a woman from being killed at Ennis on November 6th last, has been awarded the Albert Medal by the King. The Lord Lieutenant will present it to Mr. Cullinan at the Castle at 3 p.m. to-morrow week, the 14th inst.

LIMERICK CENTENARIAN.

On Sunday the remains of Bridget Danaher were interred in Caherconlish Cemetery. The deceased, who had reached the marvellous age of 112 years, had been an inmate of the Limerick Union for the past two years. She was a native of Ballyhuddane, and up to the time she was transferred to the Union had enjoyed good health.

A PROMISING YOUTH

(BY TELEGRAPH TO-DAY.)

At Clerkenwell Sessions to-day, Richard Jones, aged nineteen, was sentenced to eighteen months' hard labour for housebreaking at Hackney. Detective Dew said the prisoner was night porter at Haxell's Hotel, Strand, last November, when a daring burglary was committed, the safe being carried away, and the prisoner left bound and apparently insensible. The prisoner's story was that two men had attacked him with sandbags and beat him unconscious. The police did not believe this story, but there was no evidence to charge him, although there was no doubt he had concocted the robbery with confederates.

CORK REGISTRAR'S DEFALCATIONS.

In the House of Commons last night, there was a long debate on the defalcations of Mr. Curry, the absconding Cork Registrar, and Mr. Cherry said proceedings were pending against his sureties, and that no effort would be spared on his part or by the Government to recover the money and indemnify the suitors if that can be done.

Mr. Ellis Griffith brought in a Bill to prevent public experiments on dogs.

STATE OF IRISH TRADE.

Mr. Boland urged that Consular reports should specifically mention Irish trade, instead of lumping them with others under the denomination of the United Kingdom. It would be of great value to Ireland if the figures were split up, and he believed that could be very readily done. They were endeavouring to have an industrial revival in Ireland, and wanted to know what goods came from foreign countries, in order to take stock of their position.

BOOTS FOR IRELAND.

Mr. Boland told the House last night that last year 82,000 pairs of Boots were dumped into Ireland from America.

IRISH CANAL SERVICE.

It is understood that the Irish Nationalist members will take an early opportunity of urging in Parliament that their country should be more adequately represented on the Royal Commission on Canals. They point out that there are three important canals in Ireland, and that their importance is increased by comparatively high railway rates.

FISCAL DEBATE.
