It is stated on the best authority that the through connection between Fishguard, Rosslare, and the South of Ireland will be an accomplished fact next month, when the opening will take place with great éclat. The Great Western Railway Company intend to leave no stone unturned in order to secure the delivery of the American mails at Fishguard, and it is stated that these mails would then be delivered in London, Manchester, Birmingham, Liverpool, and other large centres in 125 hours after leaving New York.

The chief mourners were—Mrs. Delap (widow); Miss Delap (sister); W. J. Delap, Rev. A. H. Delap, R.A.M.C. (sons); Mrs. Hemphill, Mrs. Robinson, Mrs. Goodwin, Misses Mary, Maud, and Constance Delap (daughters); Rev. Dr. Hemphill, Rev. Edmund Robinson, and Singleton Goodwin (sons-in-law); and Archibald D. Robinson (grandson). The Rev. A. H. Delap, Rector of Strabane, and the Ven. Raymond Orpen, Archdeacon of Ardara, conducted the obsequies at the grave, an address being given by the Rev. Dr. Hemphill, Rector of Berr.
