A Manchester correspondent learns that Messrs. W. and R. Jacob, biscuit makers, Dublin, have acquired land in Trafford Park for the development of their business. Messrs. J. and P. Coats, Ltd., the well-known thread manufacturers of Paisley, who already have large works in America, Russia, Germany, etc., have decided to cancel extensions at home owing to local interference between them and their female employees, and to build abroad instead. Excavations had already been started at Paisley for a new mill to cost about a quarter of a million, but this work has been stopped. Consternation has been caused in the town by the firm's attitude.
