JUDGE'S ADDRESS.

His Lordship, addressing the Grand Jury, said the Munster Winter Assize county was comprised of the counties of Clare, Limerick, Kerry, Cork, and Tipperary, and in addition to those, the cities of Limerick and Cork, so that the district of crime from which they had to investigate was a very large one, and having regard to the returns laid before him, they would not be surprised to hear that their labours would be somewhat extensive. He did not mean to say that they would be too long. There were certain cases that came forward from the previous Assizes, but with these they would have nothing to do: There were altogether, so far as he could gather from the figures laid before him by the Clerk of the Crown and Peace, 38 cases for investigation by them. These embraced 45 bills. Most of the cases were, his lordship thought, of a simple character; there did not appear to be very much complication of fact, and in the greater number no great difficulty of law. Taking the countine in the order in which they were given in the Order in Council, he found there were six or seven cases of assault from the County Clare, some of which were not serious. Two were serious enough, a razor, an iron weapon, and a stick having been used in one or other of these. There was a case of a most serious nuture from the County Clare—a case of assault on a man named Clune by, as sileged, two men named Lyons and and Malone. It appeared that this man was going along a pablic road or path when he found two men, against whom the indictment was prepared, apparently lying in wait for him and apparently partially disguised with their faces partially blackened. Another was the most serious of those sent forward from that county. That was the case in which the accused was charged with shooting at a man with intent to murder him. It apparently arose out of some dispute over the caretakership of a farm—the Gloster farm—and according to the story told by the Crown witnesses the accound on a particular day, the 12th September, was walking across a field in the broad day light, came up and discharged three bullats into the injured man's hody. bultets into the injured The county of Limerick seemed to be tolerably man's immune from crime, only four cases being returned for trial from the whole of this returned for trial from the whole considerable county. One was a charge of manalaughter. There was no crime known to law which varied so much in degree of criminality as the charge of manelaughter.
