LIMERICK UNION.

THE Guardians of the above Union, at their meeting, to be held on Wednesday the 14th February, 1906, will consider tenders for supplying the Union with 200 or 300 tons of Best Steam Coals, at such times and in such quantities as may be required by the Master. The coal must be "through and through," and supplied from some of the following collieries.—Llewesmerthyr, Globe, Ocean, Nixon's Navigation, Ebbow Vale, or Great Western Steam. The coal must be fresh wrought at the time of shipment, and must be delivered (carriage free), direct from ship to Union, and "colliery certificate," and "bill of lading," to be furnished before delivery. Parties tendering must make a deposit of £3, which sum shall be forfeited unless bond for due fulfilment of contract be completed within 10 days from the acceptance of tenders. Tenders must be lodged at the Workhouse before 12 o'clock noon on above named day marked on outside "Steam Coal." The Guardians do not bind themselves to accept the lowest or any tender.

N.B.—The coal must contain a percentage of 50 large which should be stated in the Colliery certificate.—By Order,

LIMERICK UNION.

THE Board of Guardians of this Union will, on Wednesday, the 14th February, 1906, receive (from local dealers only) tenders, accompanied by 1lb samples, for the supply to the workhouse of 40 chests or 80 half-chests of tea in bond, at 1s per lb nett each. Chests or half-chests must be of uniform quality, and in one lot, bearing chop mark, ex-ship, which must be named in tender. The contractor will be bound to advance the duty and deliver the tea from the bonded stores in Limerick direct to any officer of the union as it is ordered, and pay any storage upon it. Merchant's taxes to be allowed to the guardians. In the event of the Master of the Workhouse finding any chest not equal to the sample, the contractor will be bound to forfeit 6d per lb on such chest. The guardians reserve to themselves the right of accepting and dividing equally the supplying of the tea between two contractors whose samples may be found the most suitable. A sample fee of 2s 6d must be delivered to me along with each sample of tea sent in for competition. Tenders containing the names of two solvent sureties for the due performance of the contract, to be lodged in tender box not later than 11 o'clock a.m. on the above day, marked "Tea"—By order,

PAINFUL WATERFORD CASE.

In the Court of Appeal on Thursday, before the Lord Chancellor, Lord Justice Fitzgibbon, and Lord Justice Holmes, judgment was delivered in the case of Murray v. Fitzgerald. It was an appeal by the defendant from the judgment of the King's Bench Division (Mr. Justice Gibson dissenting), which refused his application that the judgment found for the plaintiff, Michael Murray, at last Waterford Summer Assizes (Mr. Justice Johnson) should be entered for him, William Fitzgerald. The action was one brought against the defendant for betrayal of the plaintiff's sister; this resulted in a verdict for the plaintiff, £100 damages being awarded.

The appeal was dismissed, Lord Justice Holmes dissenting.
