RAILWAY RATES.

DISCUSSED AT ENNIS.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT).

There was a long discussion on railway rates at Ennis Urban Council meeting, and a resolution was carried expressing surprise that the Railway Co., had refused to carry out their agreement when the amalgamation took place, to group Ennis with Limerick as far as railway rates are concerned, and calling on the County Council to insist that the guarantees should be carried out even if legal means were necessary, and asking the assistance of the Party representatives, Clare Co. Council, Kilrush Urban Council, and various rural districts of Clare. It was pointed out that Ennis trade was heavily handicapped by the rates and it was urged that if the County Council took the matter up legally, it was a question whether they might not have a claim against the Railway Company for every penny paid to them extra, over and above the tolls of rates, for the past six years, since the amalgamation. The Chairman, Mr. Linane, emphasized Mr. Tierney's remark that the County Council acted like a parcel of schoolboys in taking those guarantees as they did from the Railway Company, rather than like business men, and everyone had deplored their action since.

DEATH.

DROWNED AT CORK

The body of Mr. Maurice Frewen, owner of the Dolphin Bar, in Merchant-street, Cork, was picked out of the River Lee on Tuesday, by Sergeant Nagle and Constable Cahal, who did all they could to save him. A jury found that he had committed suicide while in a state of temporary insanity, and expressed deep sympathy with his young wife and family.

It was shown that Mr. Frewen got out of bed about half-past three that morning, put on hurriedly a few articles of wear, and told his wife that he was going to the lavatory. He had, it is stated, been complaining of sleeplessness this short time back, and was somewhat troubled by a bad stomach. The deceased, who was a native of Limerick and went to Cork from this city to engage in business for himself six or seven years ago, made many friends in Cork, and was a well-known figure in Gaelic athletic circles. He was sober and industrious in his habits, and his peculiarly tragic end will come as a shock to his many friends, more especially to his young wife, who is prostrated by the shocking calamity.
