**THE GUARDIAN'S BETE NOIR**

At the meeting of the Limerick Board of  
Guardians yesterday, Mr. John M'Inerney, J.P.,  
presiding, a letter was received from Mr. A. J.  
Robinson, solicitor, Dublin, on behalf of the  
Irish Medical Association, making application  
for payment of the salaries voted to the Dis-  
pensary Medical Staff recently, and due on the  
30th ult. Should the Guardians decline to make  
these payments, Mr. Robinson requested them  
to name a solicitor to accept service of a writ to  
compel payment. The letter concluded thus—"Our  
clients have no wish to enter into litigation with  
your Board from who they have invariably  
received courtesy and consideration, but  
in a matter affecting their salaries and means of  
livelihood no option is left to them, but to take  
such steps as they may be advised to enforce  
payment.

Mr. Cuddihy proposed that the increases be  
paid as sanctioned by the Local Government  
Board.

Mr. Kelly seconded the motion.  
Mr. Bourke said a notice of motion was  
necessary, before payment could be made.  
Mr. Kelly advised that litigation was not the  
cheapest way out of it.

Alderman Donnellan said a statement had  
been made that the increase would involve an  
additional burthen of £1,100 on the ratepayers,  
which they were unable to pay. If a compromise  
could be effected in some way to lessen that  
burthen, it might be unanimous. Let the  
matter be discussed again on notice of motion.

Mr. Lynch predicted defeat if they went to  
law.

The Clerk said payment could be made forth-  
with by passing a resolution.

Mr. Bourke held to the contrary.  
The Clerk retaliated by saying that the  
Guardians could not over-ride the order of the  
Local Government Board.

Mr. J. B. Harrington ultimately moved that  
inasmuch as it was not legal to pay the increased  
salaries until the question had been first  
considered by the Finance Committee, the  
question be referred back to that body.

Mr. Bourke seconded, and the division resulted  
as follows:—

Notices of motion were then handed in by  
Captain O'Brien deferring payment until the  
commencement of the next financial year, as no  
provision had been made for the advance in the  
current estimate.
