The witness, in cross-examination by Mr. O'Callaghan solicitor for the defence, denied striking the prisoner with his baton. He drew the baton twice in order to keep the crowd away. Scott's face was bleeding.

For the defence Mary Browne deposed that Scott's face was covered with blood when he was brought into her house, and the neighbours came in and washed it off. Then two policemen came in and asked his name and he told them. He was brought out and knocked in the yard.

In answer to the Acting-Sergeant she said she did not see any policeman strike him with a baton.

Constable Smith said the prisoner attempted to strike him on the face and they had to bring him to the barrack by force.

Mr. Hickson said he held in his hand a memorandum from which it appeared that there were no less than 68 previous convictions against the accused for assaults on the police, larceny, etc. It was necessary when the police came across these characters that they should take strong measures for their own protection.

Mr. O'Callaghan said the man had drink taken on the occasion. He got a bad hammering, and had been a week in gaol.

Mr. Hickson said the prisoner whenever he got the opportunity took it out of the police, and now the Magistrates were going to take it out of him by giving him three months' imprisonment with hard labour.

JOHN'S "SIX INCH SMILE."

BECAUSE HE SAVED HIS BAIL.

John McInerney, a farmer, from Knockakibbaun, Ennis, came before the Petty Sessions at Ennis yesterday, and succeeded in getting out of the difficulty in which he landed himself at the previous court by not answering a witness summons, and he further succeeded in "landing" Martin Harte, of Ennis, in Limerick Prison for fourteen days.

Martin was charged with the larceny of a bridle, valued at 4s, belonging to Mr. Thomas Molony, Mill Street, and according to John's narrative, Harte one day came into him as he was working in a field, and asked him to buy a bridle, saying he had sold all the rest of his harness and ass and cart. He wanted "two bob." John offered 1s, and finally they "split the difference," and McInerney became the owner.

Subsequently however Constable Bowden called on him, and obtained the bridle from him.

Mr. Molony identified the article, the missing of which he had reported.

The defendant pleaded guilty, and in consideration of his good conduct was sentenced to 14 days only, while in view of the candour and straightforward way in which McInerney had given his evidence, the bench suggested that his (witness) recognisances might not be forfeited, as had been ordered last court day.

Mr. Supple consented to this, and John left court with a "six-inch smile" on his expressive countenance.
