Mary Hurley, charged with placing gelatine dynamite with detonators in a house in Allibies, with intent to blow it up, was acquitted at Cork Assizes.

At the meeting of the Cork Public Health Committee, Sub-sanitary Inspector Fitzgerald reported the seizure of a large quantity of unsound fish and a small amount of pigs feet in an unsound condition.

On Sunday a public meeting of the Nationalists of Abbeyfeale was held for the purpose of making the annual appeal in aid of the Parliamentary Fund. Previous to the meeting the local brass band paraded the town.

At Cork Assizes two soldiers named Morris and Maye, found guilty on the previous day of housebreaking and the larceny of two watches at Kinsale, were sentenced to three months imprisonment each.

While a number of boys were playing a few evenings ago at Miller's Marsh a large stone or flag fell upon one of their number named Thomas Hennessey, inflicting serious injuries. He was removed to the City and County Infirmary, where he died from tetanus. The Coroner has been communicated with.

The King has appointed Dr. Anantok Mukerji to be a Puisne Judge of the High Court, Calcutta in place of the late Mr. Justice Henderson.

A meeting of the Cabinet was held yesterday morning, the Prime Minister presiding.

St. Petersburg, Thursday.—A Samara telegram states that the whole town of Syoran, Government of Simbrisk, is in flames. Many labourers on strike here were killed and wounded in a collision with the troops.

Warsaw, Thursday.—The agrarian strike is still spreading. Wholesale murders of policemen have occurred in the Rublin province.

St. Petersburg, Thursday.—The semi-official journal "Rossia" to-day states in an article that Germany and Austria have agreed upon armed intervention in Russian affairs, in the event of the extension of the agrarian disorders.

The War Office have awarded the Rochester Court of Free Fishermen £400 compensation for damage to their oyster grounds by the erection of a pier at Sharfleet Creek, near Rochester.

During 1905, 1,124 foreigners, 349 more than in the previous year, took out naturalisation papers in Cape Colony. Of this number 766 were Russians and 39 Germans.

De Beers Diamond Corporation has promised a donation of £2,500 towards the fund for the proposed South African College for the higher education of natives.

A Berlin newspaper reported an attempt to assassinate the Grand Duke Vladimir on Monday night, while travelling from Hamburg to Paris, by wrecking the train in which he was travelling, but the attempt was frustrated by a watchman.

It is stated that the King contemplates making over Balmoral Castle to the Prince of Wales. Balmoral, as is well-known, was the favourite residence of the late Queen Victoria, but King Edward never liked the place, it being too dull for a man of his temperament.

In the wrestling match yesterday between Hackenschmidt, the Russian, and M'Inerney of Clare, the Irishman was thrown twice in 25 mins. 24 secs., and owing to the tendons of the upper arms giving way had to give up the contest then. If he had held out for six minutes more he would have won the match.
