Mr. W. C. Eades, M.A., has resigned the

years. He carries with him in his retirement

A party of Belgian journalists who are visiting  
this country landed at Southampton on Tuesday  
and were welcomed by the Mayor and some re-  
presentative English journalists. After inspect-  
ing the docks they were entertained at lunch by  
the London and South Western Railway Com-  
pany.

Lady Hamilton, wife of Sir Charles Edward  
Hamilton, died on Monday, at their country re-  
sidence, Hatley Park, Gamlingay, Cambs, after  
being confined to her room for sixteen weeks.

Scores of people were prostrated in New York  
on Monday by a heat wave, which caused ten  
deaths. Many left the city at night to stay by  
the seashore.

Mr. Lloyd Edwards, Glamorgan, County  
Surveyor, died on Tuesday. He was brother of  
Mr. Frank Edwards, M.P., and cousin of the  
Bishop of St. Asaph.

Owing to the absence of magistrates the usual  
fortnightly Petty Sessions Court was not held  
at Kildysart on Monday. There were only two  
cases listed for hearing, one of trespass of cattle  
and a case of simple drunkenness.

We regret to record the death of Dr. E. Hogan,  
of London, which took place on Tuesday. The  
deceased was second son of the late Mr. Edmund  
Hogan, of Rathjordan House, Herbertstown.

Three young men and two young women were  
remanded by the Liverpool Stipendiary on  
Tuesday, charged with taking part in a serious  
fight between Catholics and Orangemen,  
in the course of which many windows were  
wrecked and walls demolished to keep up the  
supply of missiles.

Bank holiday on Monday was a record one  
in point of sobriety in Dublin. There were only  
25 cases in the Police Courts on Tuesday—nine  
in the Northern and sixteen in the Southern,  
while on previous occasions there were as many  
as 60.

"Your conduct is of the most inhuman kind,"  
said the Chairman at the Lurgan Petty Sessions  
on Tuesday to Wm. Macready, who was  
summoned for cruelty to his wife and children.  
Macready was ordered three months imprison-  
ment.

£10 or four months' imprisonment was the  
penalty imposed at Bansha, Co. Tipperary, on  
Tuesday, on Patrick Tobin, labourer, for having  
knowingly on his premises parts of the carcass of  
a deer two days after eight deer had been killed  
by some persons unknown on the lands of Mr.  
Thomas Butler, D.L., Ballycarron.

Mr. Henry Charles White, J.P., whose tragic  
death by drowning in the artificial lake at  
Charleville House, Queen's County, took place on  
Saturday evening, was a brother of Miss White,  
Principal of the Alexandra College Dublin,  
one of the best-known educationists in the  
Kingdom.

The trawler, Star Peace, the property of Mr.  
Hapcock, Milford Haven, while fishing off  
Curracloe on the Wexford coast, took fire in  
the companion hatch, and the blaze defying

Regiment, has now been formally appointed to

Regiment at Kilkenny, for which position he  
was selected several weeks ago.
