IMPORTANT DECISION.

The House of Lords on Tuesday gave judg-A London firm ment in a money-lending case. of money-lenders, trading as P. Saunders, lene to a Mr. Alton, of Derby, since deseased £2,000. It was to be repaid within twelve months at the rate of £250 a month. Mr. Alton died the rate of £250 a month. Mr. Alton died after making the first payment, and when the money-lenders claimed on his estate the executor offered to pay the balance of £1,750, plus moderate interest. Mr. Justice Kekewich gav judgment for the executor on the ground that the transaction between the appellants and Alton was barsh and unconscionable. The Appeal Court in the main affirmed, and the House of Lords to-day affirmed it judgments, holding that 104 per cent was an excessive rate of interest. The money-lenders' appeal was dismissed interest. The money-lenders appeal was dismissed with costs.

THE LATE MR, JOS. HOULIHAN, MALLOW.

On Saturday last, at the comparatively ear y age of 58 years, the demise of Mr. J. Houliban took place at Beechmount, Mallow, Co. From that the mournful procession, large and representative, speaking well of the high esteem in which he had been rightly held, wended its course to Manister Cemetery, where, in the old family resting place, amid every manifestation of popular kindly feeling, the interment took place. The other clergymen present were of the late Mr. The other clergymen present were of the late Mr. Houlihan's native parish—Ballingarry and the adjoining one, Bruree, viz.—Rev. John Ryan, P.P.; Rev. Stephen Culhane, C.C.; Rev. Michael McCoy, C.C., and Rev. Eugene Sheeny, P.P. The deceased gentleman, coming of one of the oldest and most esteemed County Limerick families, was son of the late Mr. Michael Houliban, Kilmore, Granagh, Ballingarry.

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
