ASSAULT AT THE RACES.

SMART PENALTY.

At the County Petty Sessions, today, John
Grady, Kilmahulla, County, Clare, summoned
Patrick Ryan and Michael Ryan, neighbours of
his, for assaulting him at Ballinacorra, on the
4th October, the second day of the Limerick
Races. Michael Grady summoned Michael
Ryan for assault on the same occasion.
Mr. E. Leahy appeared for the Grady; and
Mr. Counihan for the Ryans.
It appeared from the evidence of John Grady
whose head was bandaged, that he was coming
out through one of the gates at the course when
the defendants assaulted him on the head with
ash plants, which they had in their hands. He had
given no provocation for the assault, but on the
Sunday previous some difference arose between
the parties owing to Ryan's sister pulling off
Grady's sister's hat. Constable Neilson deposed
to seeing part of the row, and the Ryan's beating
Grady with ash plants. Michael Grady having
been examined in the case against Michael Ryan.
Evidence was given for the defense by James
M'Eniry and another witness named Mara that
they saw no sticks used in the row.
Mr. Hickson said they had no doubt after hear-
ing the evidence of the constable that sticks were
used. The Ryans would be fined 40s each, a third
of the sum to go to John Grady to compensate
him for expenses he had incurred in connection
with medical attendance.
Mr. Leahy asked for costs, and £1 was allowed.
Mr. Counihan asked to have the fine reduced,
as his clients were poor men.
The order, however, was not varied, Mr.
Hickson stating the case of Michael Grady
against Michael Ryan was ruled therein.

TORPEDO BOAT AT FOYNES.

H.M. twin screw torpedo gun boat, "Swiflet,"
Lieut. Commander R. W. Travers, arrived at
Foynes on the 16th inst. and anchored to the
east of the Pier. We understand the vessel has
been engaged in connection with the Coastguard

Queens town on the 18th inst.

**DEATH AND FUNERAL OF MRS
BRIDGET IRWIN, BELFAST.**

On Tuesday last the interment took place in
Roscommon graveyard of Mrs. Irwin, wife of ex
Head Constable Robert Irwin, who for many years
served in Roscommon, where he was most popular.
The deceased was a member of a well-known Ros-
common family, her uncle, the late Dr. Mahennan,
who was greatly esteemed, being interred in the
Abbey graveyard. For the past 35 years
deceased resided with her husband in Belfast.
Sympathy with an old member of the force was
evidenced by the constabulary in Belfast carrying
the coffin from deceased's late residence to the
G.N. Railway. On arrival at Roscommon
station a similar compliment was paid deceased
by members of local force, under direction of
Head Constable Killackey. The funeral gave
ample proof of the high esteem in which the
deceased and her family are held in Roscommon.
The chief mourners were the deceased's husband
and Mr. Folk (nephew).
