Mr. H. D. Conner, K.C. (instructed by Mr. Kenny), on behalf of the solicitor having carriage, now stated that the tenants raised the point that on the occasion on which they agreed to purchase their holdings it was represented to them that the scheme would work out at a reduction of 6s 6d in the £ on their rents, but now, owing to their having to pay certain rates in the City of Limerick which they had not to pay formerly, the scheme would work out much less advantageously for them. Counsel, however, had calculated the figures, and found that what they would have to pay for general purposes rate and improvement rate was 3s 10½d in the £, which still left them a considerable reduction. These holdings were near the city of Limerick, and had valuable market gardens.

Mr. Daniel F. Browne, K.C. (instructed by Mr. Gaffney) for the tenants, said according to the return made by Mr. Bryan O'Donnell, head of the Rates Department in Limerick, the tenants would have to pay a good deal more than 3s 10½d, and in the case of a tenant named Hannan what he would have to pay after he purchased would be actually higher than his present payments.

Eventually the case was adjourned to get a statement from the Town Clerk as to what rates the tenants would have to pay.
