 There was a Gaelic revival in the Town Hall, Kilrush, on St. Patrick's Night, embracing an impromptu concert, which was a great success, and also some step-dancing and other entertainments. The attendances were large. There was no meeting of the Kilrush Board of Guardians on Saturday.

 We regret to announce the death of Mrs. Mary McCarthy, of Ballyhill, Ballingarry, which took place at the residence of her son-in-law, Mr. Carroll, Bruree, Co. Limerick, after a protracted illness. An immense funeral procession, 1 1/2 miles in length, comprised of people from Newcastle West to Kilmallock, and including large contingents from the County of Cork, accompanied the remains from Bruree to Springfield, Dromcollogher, the family burial place.
 The Rev. Michael Sheehan, D.D., Maynooth, preached a sermon in Gaelic at St. Michael's Church on St. Patrick's Night, when a special religious service was field. The Rosary was recited in Gaelic and some hymns also sung in the ancient language.
 The lace worn by her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen at the recent Drawing Room was purely Irish. The veil of Limerick lace came from Mrs. Vere O'Brien's school, and won the 1st prize at the Limerick Exhibition a fortnight ago; and the point lace on the skirt was from Youghal.
