V. Morony, B.E., moved the adoption of the report and said that it was a very good statement on the whole. Even their financial balance was small, they improve it next year.

A. Adgerly seconded the motion. The President, in putting the motion, said it was elected to the position twelve months ago he had hoped to be present at all meetings of the Club, but since then he had been too far away in connection with business matters, and consequently he was unable to review the work of the Club for the year. It was dealt with adequately in the report. The falling off in membership was slight, but it ought to be the other way round a few or even half of them would be induced to join each year. In connection with this question they ought to take general interest in the working of the Club, and not merely turn up at meetings. They should try and provide material themselves. The President, in moving the adoption of the report, paid a tribute to the work of the club by the Doctors Fogarty. He also mentioned the series of lectures on Botany

... a certain amount of pain, as in the case of the Queen v. MacDonagh, this was a step towards establishing it an offence under the second section of the Act 12 and 13 Victoria. He (the Chairman) also mentioned that their decision might have been different had it been proved to their satisfaction that an adequate substitute to this mark had been found or was available which would last after the pigs had been dealt with. Many marks were suggested, but none were proved to the satisfaction of the Bench to be effectual. The substitutes recommended even as between the fair and arrival at the bacon factory were regarded as insufficient on the evidence on account of the liability to have the marks rubbed off by pigs rolling in the street in wet weather.

**SON'S THREATS.**

At an adjourned City Petty Sessions yesterday, James Fehane, a returned American, was charged with threatening his mother on Sunday. From the evidence disclosed it appears that defendant, who only returned from New York on Thursday after a very brief residence there, looked up a shindy in the home, and ended by demolishing the furniture. He was sent to goal for three months, in default of getting bail to the amount of £30 and two sureties of £10 each.

**ASSAULT ON UNION OFFICIAL.**

At yesterday's City Police Court, Michael Carr, who was described as a non-worker, was charged on a warrant with assaulting Mr. James O'Neill, wardmaster of the Union. On information made on Friday, prosecutor stated that Carr met him on the Wallisley Bridge on the 6th inst., and attempted to throw him over the parapet. Not having succeeded, he belaboured him with his fists along the road to the workhouse gate. Accused was ordered two months imprisonment, in default of bail, Mr. Hickson remarking that if he were sitting alone he would have him returned for trial.

**SUDDEN DEATH.**

About 4.30 p.m., yesterday Constable Stapleton was proceeding from Newcastle West to his station at Knockaderry, and when at Upper Grange he found the body of a man lying dead on the roadway. It appears the man was Maurice McAuliffe, one of the workmen of Mr. Robert Cussen, solr., on his farm at Kilcolinan, East, and was returning home having driven his master as far as the Crooked Tree, and being subject to heart disease fell of the car. He was 34 or 35 years of age, and a native of Kilcolinan.
