Rome, Wednesday.

DEATH OF MR. STEPHEN O'BRIEN.

We very much regret to announce the death
of Mr. Stephen O'Brien, Clare street, which took
place unexpectedly on Tuesday night at half past
ten. At that hour Mr. O'Brien was, with a
number of friends, in the Athlunkard Boat
Club, of which he was a member, when he was
observed to falter and immediately collapse.
His friends, of which Mr. P. Burke was one,
hastened to his assistance and did all they could
for him. When medical and spiritual aid
arrived Mr. O'Brien was sinking slowly, and he
soon afterwards passed peacefully away. The
deceased gentleman was perhaps one of the
most familiar figures in the city for half a
century, and in his long association with the
public as an official of the Grand Canal Company,
and subsequently in the Estate Office of Mr.
Michael O'Gorman, his uprightness and rectitude
earned the respect of all. Sincere sympathy is
expressed with his family in their sorrow.

THE INQUEST.

An inquest was held yesterday by Mr. Coroner
DeCourcy at the residence of the deceased, Clare
street.

The jury found, on the evidence of Dr.
O'Sullivan, that death was due to heart disease.

Mr. Beecher (the foreman) proposed a vote of
condolence with the family of deceased, with
which the Coroner said he was in entire sympathy.
All who knew the late Mr. O'Brien deeply
regretted his sudden demise.

AFFRAY AT LAS PALMAS.

Mr. Patrick O'Dea, an Irishman, a third class
passenger from Cape Town by the Union Castle
Liner, Durham Castle, was reported to be in a
dying condition when the steamer arrived at
Plymouth. When calling at Las Palmas the
unfortunate man went ashore with his com-
rades on August 1st, and there ensued a
disturbance with the natives. A brick thrown
by a native struck O'Dea on the skull, and in
an unconscious condition he was taken back to the
ship suffering from concussion of the brain.

GRAVE CATHEDRAL DEFECTS.

New defects are being found in the structure of
Winchester Cathedral, and as fast as these are
made good, says the "Pall Mall," others appear.
The latest discovery of damage concerns the
groined roof of the south aisle (nowhere near the
part of the cathedral where the chief repairs are
in progress) immediately above the memorial
window to the officers non-commissioned officers
and privates of the 6th Rifles who fell in the
Afghan, Zulu, Transvaal, and Egyptian cam-
paigns, 1879-82. This window is at the south-
west corner of Wykeham's Chantry.

It is supposed that the jarring caused by the
repairs now being carried out at the cathedral is
responsible for this new fracture, or series of
fractures, for the damage is not confined to a
single bay, but is to be found in nearly every one
of them.

A CLARE ESTATE.

On Tuesday, before Mr. Justice Gibson,
Vacation Judge, in the goods of John O'Halloran,
deceased.

Mr. Comyn (instructed by Mr. M. J. McNamara)
applied on behalf of Ellen Stack, wife of Garrett
Stack, of Ennis, master tailor, for an order
granting her letters of administration of the
estate of the deceased, who was her brother, and
for a further order dispensing with the service
of a citation on Mary Ellen O'Halloran and
Josephine O'Halloran, daughters of the deceased, who
emigrated to New Zealand several years ago.
The motion was urgent, because the assets con-
sisted of house property subject to rent, and it
was necessary to collect the rents, pay the heat
rents, and repair the premises. The delay in
service of citation in Australia would
cause serious loss.

Mr. Justice Gibson made an order ad co-
legenda bona, and dispensed with citation, but
directed that advertisements should be inserted
in New Zealand papers.

LIBERAL M.P.'S TO VISIT IRELAND.

The "Westminster" says—Ten Liberal min-
isters of the House of Commons, acting on the
advice of Mr. Bryce in a recent speech from the
Treasury Bench, in which he recommended the
members to visit Ireland to see for themselves
the social, economical, and political conditions
of the country, have organised an excursion to the
land, in which they will see the development of
the fisheries, carpet, crochet, and embroidery
industries, and pay a visit to some of the
least populated districts. The tour will embrace Dubl-
lin, Londonderry, the counties of Donegal, Sli-
Mayo, and Roscommon, and will last about
fortnight. The party will consist of Messrs
Alden, Gooch, Halley, Stewart, Black, Pri-
MacKernan, Lamb, Hazel, Rutherford, and
Horniman.
