LESS TRAIN DERAILED.

DEATH AND INJURY.

(BY TELEGRAPH TO-DAY.)

Press Association's Glasgow correspondents telegraphs:—The Aberdeen-Glasgow express train was derailed at midnight near . One person was killed and several injured.

LATER DETAILS.

Another telegram says the driver noticing things amiss, applied the brakes, but before a stop could be made, one of the vehicles ran into a bridge crossing the line, with the result that a first-class compartment was derailed, and the only occupant—Mr. A. N. Cooke, of 8, Kensington Park Gardens—was killed, his injuries being of a shocking nature.

A SAD SURPRISE.

Unfortunately, the other vehicles derailed kept on, and several of the passengers in these vehicles were injured. The train was traveling at a moderate speed, so that the cause of the accident is unknown. The three injured were taken to Glasgow. Mr. Cooke was a director of Hawthorn, Leslie, and Co., Ltd., Newmarket, near Glasgow.

Among those to meet the passengers at Central Station, Glasgow, was the son of Mr. Cooke, who was naturally much upset on hearing of his father's death.

Her enquiry shows it was a fish vehicle which struck the bridge, and then rebounded on the first carriage, in which Mr. Cooke sat. The other first carriages left the rails, but none of the passenger coaches.

WINDSOR RACES.

WATER WANT

THE POSITION OF

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT)

"They had always been grumpy about the water supply, but it had come to it, and they would not do any longer without more water."

This was the reply of a deputation of the Rural District Council on Thursday, when they had been specially called to consider the Chairman's statement that the position was so strange the complaint was made on the spot.

Mr. Hartigan, engineer, and the Council had agreed it fell lamentably short of what was required, the engineer stating that if the supply was increased four fold it would be sufficient for the 700 inhabitants who were dependent on it.

The rights of the townspeople to a water supply was insisted on by the Council, and ultimately a motion by the Council that there was no necessity for a further increase was as good now as for the last 20 years.

It was voted for by the Chairman, Messrs. Culhane, and Russell (4). While the Council voted—Messrs. Corry, O'Shaughnessy, Michael Fitzgerald. The voting chairman declined to give a casting vote, and the matter stood again adjourned.

The major argument used, was that £200 would cost £8 a year, and that there being two alternative proposals, the price was not to be considered.

The engineer made a long speech in support of the Labourers Bill, and the Council adjourned.

SHERIFF'S SALE

At the County Courthouse to-day, the sub-Sheriff, put up for sale the interest owned by Mrs. Kate Mahony, and Oola. The landlord is Dr. Pryce of Dublin. It appeared there was just £100 and costs for rent due up to 1st May. The Sheriff, having read the conditions of the bid and the sale was adjourned.
