The Appeal Court to-day reversed the decision of Mr. Justice Warrington who had ruled that the lessee of certain tied licensed premises at Eynsford, Kent, belonging to a Dartford Brewery Co. would not be committing a breach of the Covenant of Lease by exhibiting a notice in the house that no one would be served with refreshment on Sundays except visitors and their guests and travellers, and that no one would be served with drink more than once a day.

In the Divorce Court this morning, the President, Sir Gorrell Barnes, announced that he had come to the conclusion that in future the practice of sketching in the divorce court must be stopped. After long experience and close observation, he felt convinced that many persons who had to give evidence were conscious and nervous, then they otherwise would be to an extent which affected the proper giving of evidence, and that this noted to their prejudice, and might thus interfere with due administration of justice. When the court resumed in October, the order with regard to the matter would come into force and must be obeyed.

Yesterday afternoon Constable Peter Naughton of Henry Street, Belfast, was bathing at Twin Islands, and when about 150 yards from the shore he was attacked by a large porpoise, which inflicted three wounds, about three inches long on the inside of one of the legs. The constable, who is a powerful man, kicked at his assailant, which continued the attack, and was only finally beaten off by the repeated kicks of the bathers. A large number of persons were present on the shore and in the water who heard the shouts of Naughton, and when he swam ashore it was seen that he was wounded in three places. He was congratulated on his escape.

We very much regret to announce the death of Mr. Stephen O'Brien, Clare street, which took place unexpectedly on Tuesday night at half-past ten. At that hour Mr. O'Brien was, with a number of friends, in the Athlunkard Boat Club, of which he was a member, when he was observed to falter and immediately collapse. His friends, of which Mr. P. Bourke was one, hastened to his assistance and did all they could for him. When medical and spiritual aid arrived Mr. O'Brien was sinking slowly, and he soon afterwards passed peacefully away. The deceased gentleman was perhaps one of the most familiar figures in the city for half a century, and in his long association with the public as an official of the Grand Canal Company, and subsequently in the Estate Office of Mr. Michael O'Gorman, his uprightness and rectitude earned the respect of all. Sincere sympathy is expressed with his family in their sorrow.
