NEW SPEED LIMIT.

The London "Daily Express" says—A new speed limit for motor cars is to be introduced as an outcome of the recent report of the Royal Commission. The "Auctioner" says it is to be twenty-five miles instead of twenty. It is also stated that a tax of yearly fee per horse power will be proposed in the new Motor Car Bill.
