DEATH OF THE REV. J. J. NESBITT.

A large number of people in Clare will regret
to hear of the death, at the early age of 41 years,
of the Rev. Joseph John Nesbitt, who was
chaplain of the Bethesda Church, Dublin, from
1895 to 1898, when he went to England, where
he became vicar of Rodmersham, Kent. He
graduated in Trinity College in 1892, and in the
same year he was ordained for the curacy of
Trim, Co. Meath. He was subsequently
curate of Drumcliffe, Co. Clare, and remained
there until his appointment to the Bethesda
Church. He was an elocutionist of high order,
and his services as a reciter were much sought
after in Dublin and all over the country. He
was author of "The Unique Reciter" (1897),
"The Westminster Reciter" (1899), and "Lord
Roberts, V.C., and Other Recitations" (1902).
