Rainy weather is predicted.

Some five hundred excursionists from Athy arrived in town this morning and proceeded to the Exhibition.

The Candian Pacific Service from Belfast opened to-day by the sailing of the Lake Erie.

The daughter of a Bank Manager named Tapp was found drowned to-day in the River Nene. The lady yesterday went cycling.

Mr Henry M. Neill, cotton statistician, and representative of Messrs Neill Brothers, London, was killed by a street car to-day.

Owing to the grounding of a trawler in Lock-pit, at Grimsby, last night, 70 trawlers were compelled to remain in the river. Trade is virtually at a standstill, and the loss to owners and merchants will be heavy.

The Bank Rate of Discount has been raised from 3 per cent to 4 per cent.

At Old Bailey to-day George John Warreo, 19, was sentenced to death for murdering Catherine Larkham, in South Lambeth.

At Bradford this morning the discovery of a note led the police to drag the Mill Deem which resulted in the discovery of the bodies of James Holmes, 33, mechanic, and Mary Hannah Holmes 38, his wife. Circumstances point to a double suicide.

It is officially announced in Nottingham that Mr. Chamberlain will address a mass meeting to be held there on October 12th in connection with the annual meeting of the Liberal Unionist Council.

The funeral of Mr. W. W. Slade, a popular young citizen took place this morning at nine o'clock from the residence of his father, Mr. M. G. Slade, C.E., The Crescent, for interment at the family burial place, St. Mary's Cathedral. The cortege was very large and representative.

Yesterday was a general holiday in Clonmel, all business being suspended for the purpose of giving all the townspeople generally an opportunity of paying a visit to the Munster-Connacht Exhibition. By kind permission of the Rev. Father Fennelly, the band of St. Joseph's Industrial School accompanied the excursionists. A large number very much enjoyed the trip.

The "Globe" this afternoon states that at a meeting of the Bank of Ireland to-day, the Chairman discredited the rumour as to the acquisition of the Company's Buildings in Dublin by the Government.

Mr John Ward, Managing Director of Denny Brothers, shipbuilders, Dumbarton, has sailed for America. Denny's firm are said to be convinced that they could provide Sir Thomas Lipton with a challenger for American Cup provided they are given a free hand in her design and construction.

The greater part of the Russian town of Kalvarja is reported to be burned down. The population is mainly Jewish. Numbers perished in the flames.

A decorator named Joseph Barke was this morning working at St. Peter's Church, Presto when a spar broke and he fell to the chanc pavement and was killed.
