## THE LATE MR. EDMUND QUAIDE.

The funeral constituted by a very large concourse of sympathisers started on Tuesday from Clonmeeagh R.C. Church, where the interment took place amid every manifestation of regretful sympathy.

## THE UNION WORKHOUSE ADMINISTRATION.

At yesterday's meeting of the Limerick Board of Guardians, Mr. John McInerney, J.P., presiding, the Clerk submitted a report by a committee, consisting of Captain O'Brien, Lady Emily, Mrs. O'Brien, James Bourke, James Lawlor, and James Hassett, bearing on a report of Dr. Smyth, L.G.B.M.I., on the workhouse hospital, and recommended same for adoption. The report made several recommendations with regard to administration; as to cooking, washing, etc.; that (2) if a saving could be effected in the reduction of inmate helpers, two additional nurses should be appointed for the infirmary; that a deputation should wait on the Corporation with regard to the provision of a larger water main to avoid deficiency in the water supply; (7) that 23 children in the infirmary list should be transferred to another list; that St. Bridget's Day Ward should be converted into a day room for female epileptics; (9) that the Master arrange for the conveyance of fever patients in the ambulance to the door of the fever hospital; (11) that a second ambulance be provided, and the horses done away with; that the

expensive litigation on both sides is now over. The disappearance of Mr. William Shaw, the well known Belfast stockbroker, and leading promoter of local philanthropic institutions and church movements, has caused a sensation in the capital of Ulster. Mr. Shaw was adjudicated a bankrupt on the 27th inst., and a warrant for his arrest has been placed in the hands of detectives.

Ten shirts, twenty pairs of socks, four women's aprons, five pounds of tobacco, a box of cigarettes, two pounds of bacon, twenty nine skeins of black linen thread, six hair combs, five pocket handkerchiefs, a pair of scissors, a penknife, a pair of lady's black stockings, five pairs of men's woollen socks, six dozen boot thongs, and a sum of 7s or 8s. Such was the haul alleged to have been made by a Thomastown tramp named Holohan, who was returned for trial charged with having broken into the shop of Mr. James Whitty, New Ross.

The Fedamore Branch of the I.L. and L.A. have presented an address of congratulation to Mr. W. ## RUSSIAN REVOLUTIONISTS.

### Further Trouble Feared

An Exchange Co.'s St. Petersburg telegram says—The whole of the Baltic coast is strongly guarded by troops in order to prevent the importation of arms. In spite of these precautions quantities of dynamite have been smuggled into St. Petersburg. Considerable uneasiness prevails, as it is feared further acts of violence are contemplated by Revolutionists.

## PROPOSED RAILWAY TO TARBERT.

A proposal is on foot through the Kerry County Council to appeal to the Government to give a grant towards the construction of a line of railway from Listowel to Tarbert, and thus complete the missing link in the railway facilities in the South West of Ireland. This line of railway, if constructed, would be of great advantage to the Government, as the largest of their battleships can get safe anchorage at Tarbert Island. The matter will be brought up at the next Council meeting.
