## TWO FOWLS

### AND WHAT THEY COST.

At the Ennis Quarter Sessions yesterday before Judge Carton, Pat Gill and Richard Mangan, corner boys, charged with stealing two fowl, value 10s, the property of Mrs. M. H. O'Loughlin, wife of the Master of the Ennis Workhouse, on the 15th August.

The Labour Master saw the men at the fowl house, and a fowl was taken off Gill (who pleaded guilty). Mangan was found guilty by the Jury. Gill was sent to gaol for six months, and Mangan, who had "an appalling record" for 12 months, both with hard labour.

## WEATHER.

### BLIZZARDS AND SNOWSTORMS.

The worst snowstorm in the history of South Dakota for October was experienced yesterday. The trains were snowed up.

The severest October blizzard for many years was experienced at Kansas yesterday.

A snowstorm has been raging throughout the mountain district of Denver (Colorado), the severest since 1892.

Two stone bridges in East Lothian collapsed yesterday through heavy rains and flood.

Owing to the flooding on the Lammormoor Hills several sheep were drowned yesterday.

A strong gale blew over Queenstown yesterday, and continued with force until this morning, when it moderated.

Advices from Coatepec (Mexico) state that over one hundred persons were drowned there in the recent storm.

The railways in Honduras are reported seriously damaged.

On the Lammormoor Hills a motor car conveying three gentlemen to Edinburgh, stuck fast in a snowdrift last Friday, and was not able to continue the journey until yesterday morning.

## SHIPPING AT ARTHUR'S QUAY.

At the Harbour Board yesterday, Mr. Ambrose Hall, J.P., wrote to the Secretary:—"I will thank you to let me know the number of vessels passing the Swivel Bridge—i.e. to Arthur's Quay, in the years 1900-1-2-3-4 & 5, or the average per annum for the six years. I presume you will have to ask the Commissioners. You can assure them I do not want the information to use in any way to injure or likely to injure the port."
