stands at each end with twenty jars in a case,  
puts his foot on a lever and presses the jars  
against the spigots. As soon as the jars are  
filled, not another spot will run out of the  
machine until another case of empty jars is served  
in the same manner. From this machine the  
case is passed on to the "capper." The cap-  
per inserts small round pasteboard caps, which are  
waterproof, in the tops of the jars, and then  
"ices" up the case. When about two dozen  
cases are "iced" up they are taken into the ice  
room and stored for the night. At two o'clock  
in the morning the driver's work begins. He loads  
up his wagon and starts out from the dairy  
at about three o'clock, or thereabouts, to run his  
first trip. On each of his customers' front steps  
he places the desired quantity of milk or cream  
and collects the empty jars that are on the steps.  
The "second trip," which takes about four hours  
to run, is nearly all sold by the "loose" measure,  
the same as you get it in Limerick. A milkman  
here averages about 12.00 dol. a week (£2 8s),  
and works about ten hours a day. Only one trip  
is made on Sunday and holidays. The dairies  
are on a very much larger scale in America than  
in Ireland. The largest dairy in this city has 62  
wagons on the road, and each wagon turns out  
about 150 quarts of milk daily. Milk is 8c. (4d.)  
a quart, and cream 20c. (10<sup>1</sup>.) a quart, so it is a  
little dearer, but much richer in taste, than  
Irish milk. I trust this will interest some of  
my Limerick friends, and I hope to see my letter  
in the "Limerick Chronicle" which I receive  
weekly.
