Kerry, and being in receipt thereof of a salary and profits from such Kerry County Council, acted as Rural District Councillor when disqualified by reason of the office or place of profit aforesaid, as provided by Article 12 (1) of the said Order on above date."

Mr. Moran defended.

In the course of a long hearing, Mr. Condon argued that the office of Harbour Master was one "of profit," and was really a bargain with the County Council. In fact, Mr. O'Connor had the same rights, powers and authorities as if he were a member of the R.I.C., and could be called Constable T. M. O'Connor (laughter).

Mr. Moran—That is not as bad as to be a common informer.

Mr. Condon, continuing, said that from the section he had quoted it was clear that Mr. O'Connor had been appointed to a "work," and it was also a fact that his salary (£20 a year) was payable as a presentment.

Mr. Condon contended, in conclusion, that Mr. O'Connor was not entitled to act as Councillor, having regard to his appointment as Harbour Constable, and that for acting he was liable to a fine not exceeding £20.

Mr. Moran contended that as Mr. O'Connor's appointment was not by "contract," it could not be "work" as defined by the section.
