THE LATE HON. S. E. SPRING RICE.

MEMORIAL CROSS AND DRINKING FOUNTAIN AT SHANAGOLDEN.

The drinking fountain in connection with the beautiful Cline cross, which has been creeted at Shanagothen by Lord and Lady Monteagle in memory of their eldest son, the Hon. Stephen Edmond Spring Rice, who died April 7ch, 1900, aged 22 years, was opened for public use by Lord Monteagle on Tuesday, 31st July, in the presence of a group of relatives, personal friends and neighbours. The cross, which stands in a commanding pisition at the cross roots at the west end of the town, was designed after old Celtic models by 11. Hughes. It is 24 feet in height and is surmon sted by a cruc fix (somewhat like that on the cross at Toum) which was carved by Mr. Joseph Hanrahan, and is a ve yefine specimen of the curver's art. The shaft of the cross is ado ned with Celve traceries, and at the hase there are four basins forming a drinking fountain. It stands on a circular flight of steps and is all carried out in impestone from Lord Monteagle's quarries, and has been quarried, cut, and erected by his own men. There has been a great golden, the existing supply of water in Shana-golden, the existing supply being inadequate in quantity, and, especially in summer, far from satisfactory in quality. The new supply has been brought from a spring in the hill at some distance from the town, and the works in connection with it have been tedious and expensive. costing over £400 (quite apare from the cross and fountain itself), but Lord Monteagle was undaunted by failures and presevered till this plantiful supply of pure water was obtained. making this offering to Shan agolden, he said that it was the expression of his earnest desire that the memorial to one who, he knew, had endeared himself to all of them, might not be only beautiful in itself but a real benefit to the town. He dwelt with satisfaction on the fact that the work had all been carried out at home, and is was work of which he felt they might justly feel proud. The water was then turned ou, and an abundant stream issued forth. A drinking trough for cattle and a convenient tap for house bolders is to be added close to the fountain. It may be remembered that the Hon. Stephen-Spring Fice died of fever less than two years after his coming of age had been celebrated with great rejoicings, but there is ample evidence that he is not forgotten by those amongst whom he was brought up and to whose welfare he had made it his object in life to devote himself. This noble cross and fountain will be a permanent and fitting memorial of a singularly beautiful life.
