#### THE SAD DEATH OF MR. STAFFORD.

Today's "Waterford News" gives the following particulars of the death of Mr. Thos. Stufford. late clerk of the works to St. Joseph's Church here, (which we briefly reported on Tuesday), as revesled at the inquest on Saturday evening, Mr. Stafford and a timekeeper, employed at the railway works by contractors Brand and Co., left Kilrane, Tagoat, on their way home to Rosslare Harboar, where they were lodging. The night was most inclement, and they resolved to take a short out. In the darkness, and with snow s-veral inches deep on the ground, they went on until they came to apit, or marl-hole, from which material had been excavated to a considerable depth for brick making purposes. Either unaware of the proximity of the trap, or having lost their bearings, the two mens fell into the excavation, with the result that Mr. Stafford's companion was either suffocated or drowned. Mr. Stafford evidently had a hard struggle to escape, as marks on the spot indicated, but between 12 (noon) and 12.30 on Sunday, about three fields away, his body was found lying dead, undoubtedly from shock and exposure. In the morning deceased was apparently in perfect health, but it was stated that to an influente acquaintance he mentioned that when in Limerick he suffered somewhat from heart crouble.

The jury returned a verdict that George Dowson, agod 58 of Bolton, (who was with Mr. Stafford) was drowned, and that Mr. Stafford died from exposure. The deceased leaves a widow and four children to moure his loss.
