 weather all night in a pitiful condition. Next
 morning the rescuers found him dead. The
 remains were interred on Tuesday at Knockby
 in the presence of a large assemblage. A hand-

INSPECTION OF CREAMERIES.

In the House of Commons on Tuesday night,
 Mr. Joyce asked the Chief Secretary to the
 Lord, Lieutenant whether his attention had been
 called to the fact that a number of creameries
 in Ireland are registered by the Department
 and subject to regular inspection; and, if so, is
 there anything to prevent the Department regis-
 tering other makers and exporters of butter who
 are satisfied to have their premises registered
 and inspected at any moment by an official
 of the Department.
 Mr. Bryce explained that under the scheme
 of the Department of Agriculture for en-
 couraging improvement in the management of
 creameries a great many creameries were regu-
 larly inspected, and a register of those in which
 the prescribed conditions were observed was
 published annually. There was nothing to pre-
 vent the owners of private dairies from taking
 advantage of the scheme, but several of the con-
 ditions were not such as would suit the business
 of a butter exporter.
