YOUNG PEOPLE'S DAY.

To-day was a "Young People's Day" at the  
Exhibition, the Directors having made special  
arrangements for their amusement and enter-  
tainment. Needless to say it proved a real letter  
day for the young folk, a great number of whom  
were present in the afternoon not alone from  
the city but several outlying districts. The  
weather was beautifully fine, and so there was  
nothing to mar the enjoyment of the occasion.  
A half-holiday had been given in the Christian  
Brothers Schools and other schools in town to  
enable the pupils to visit the Exhibition.

The opening ceremony was performed at  
twelve o'clock by the Mayor in the Main Hall.  
The band of the Industrial School (the boys of  
which were amongst those present) having  
performed some choice selections.

The Mayor said it was a great pleasure to him  
to be the means of opening the "Young People's  
Day" at the Exhibition and he rather thought  
that the intention of the Directors in arranging  
that day was to show their appreciation of the  
way in which they had been met by the Christian  
Brothers, not alone in Limerick but many parts  
of the country. The cost of the day was not
